In rural Liberia, a simple approach to Bible storytelling is helping Pastor Arthur Wouzon bring Scripture beyond his church's walls.

For years, Pastor Arthur Wouzon has shared the gospel with people in and around Beadatuo Town, Liberia, but some hadn't been interested.

Recently, Arthur joined a Bible Storytelling Workshop led by staff in Living Water Liberia. There, Arthur and other pastors practiced memorizing Scripture as stories and learned ways to invite listeners into the telling, making the experience more engaging, participatory, and easier to share beyond a traditional church service. For Arthur, the difference was immediate.

"I no longer struggle to plead for people's attention," he said. "Everyone I share a story with becomes interested and wants to understand more."

The experience also gave Arthur something he could pass along. Back at his church, he began training Sunday school teachers and encouraging members of the evangelism team to learn and tell Bible stories themselves. Storytelling was becoming more than another way for Arthur to preach. It was giving others the confidence and tools to share their faith, too.

"This approach to sharing the gospel," Arthur said, "has increased my passion for evangelism and strengthened my confidence in fulfilling the Great Commission."

And now, as Arthur equips others to tell these stories, the gospel is reaching farther into the community.
